

Jesus' Resurrection: Give it Some Thought "He opened their minds so they could understand the scriptures." (Luke 24:45)

The events surrounding the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus are the most significant events in all human history, (with the possible exception of Jesus' conception and birth.) So, it makes sense that these events have been lifted up and celebrated throughout the world, now, for two millennia. A Rasmussen Survey taken last year found that 73% of Americans celebrate Easter in some way. Of those, 33% celebrate it as a religious holiday, 15% as a secular holiday and 22% as a combination. Of those surveyed 46% said they would attend Easter Sunday morning services. It's encouraging to hear that so many still regard Easter as a significant part of their yearly celebrations.

If you're like me, though, you find that it's easy to end up just going through the motions in our celebrations. It's not that our hearts are in the wrong place, it's just that, often, we have so many traditional family customs to maintain that we can pass over the meaning of Jesus being our Passover Lamb. We don't leave room to ruminate on the significance of Jesus total victory over death to give us life.

Since the earliest years following Jesus' resurrection, his followers have tried to find good ways to help them reflect on the things Jesus accomplished for humanity on that terrible, but joyful weekend.

Irenaeus, who was taught by a guy named Polycarp, (who, himself, had been taught by John the Disciple,) wrote that his forefathers had been intentionally putting practices into place in order to help them properly grasp the importance of Jesus' resurrection each year. This means these practices were those of Jesus' disciples, themselves. Irenaeus was primarily talking about the use of fasting.

Fasting, of course, is the choice to refrain from eating food for a certain amount of time. Today it's thought of as something we do before a medical procedure or as a health or diet plan. But as a Christian practice its purpose is to heighten a person's attention on a truth or a goal. There are many reasons that fasting helps us focus. One is that we can use the time it takes to prepare a meal, and to consume it, to reflect on what it is we're highlighting in our life at the time. Fasting is also a natural "notification system" as each hunger pang is like an alarm we can use to draw ourselves back into thoughtful, intentional reflection each time it "goes off".

Over the years the Church has encouraged people to start purposeful reflection on the meaning of Jesus' work on the cross, and his resurrection, 40 days prior to Resurrection Sunday. This preparation time, called "Lent", is meant to be a "spiritual spring-time" where we're waking up to the Son in fresh ways. People practiced fasting during this time in different ways; eating only one meal each day, or skipping one meal/day, or refraining from certain types of foods on certain days, (like eating fish rather than other meat on Fridays.) More often, today, the season is seen as a time of just "giving something up". Which is better than nothing if used properly.

Whether any of these practices are actually meaningful and healthy for us depends on whether or not they actually help us to consciously reflect on the meaning and accomplishments surrounding the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus. Lent means nothing if it isn't deepening our love and trust in Jesus and his work on our behalf. Still, our love for Jesus, as for anyone else, doesn't deepen unless we cultivate it, and cultivation requires time and attention.

Here are some things you can to do help cultivate your appreciation for Jesus this Easter season: Fast for one meal during the week prior to Easter Sunday and use that time to read from the Gospel of John, chapters 14-21. Let your hunger remind you to pray and ask God to understand what Jesus has done for you. We can also take advantage of the Holy Week services at noon each day of the week leading into Easter. Take time to give it some thought.

Good afternoon and hope all is well with everyone!

First to begin I want to update everyone on the children's ministry at Las Parcelas with Pastor Pedro. The construction of the kitchen we completed last year has been a blessing. Since the Wednesday children's ministry began, we have served over 700 meals since the beginning of November 2022. We have also started four gardens in the community to help provide fresh produce for the meals on Sunday. We already have some squash and tomatoes available from the gardens that will be used to help provide for the meals. Within the next couple weeks we hope to see peppers and cucumbers to add to the other produce. We are also exploring other things that can be planted like watermelon, cantaloupe, onion, corn, and radishes. Pastor Pedro is in charge of all of this and monitors the 4 gardens every week to communicate with me on needs and future needs.

We will be getting a projector next week that we will be using to help in teaching the children. I was able to bring a donated computer back with me in February. The combination of these two items will allow Pastor Pedro to expand his resources and allow him to present the teaching to the children in a variety of ways to help keep the kids engaged in the teachings.

This past Sunday Pastor Pedro baptized four people (2 adults, 2 children). The kitchen did not only provide a safe place to cook food, but also provide a place for adults to share their gifts and be active in the church. Please continue to pray for this ministry!

I would also like to take this moment to share with you a new children's ministry that is in need of a classroom. Pastor Rudy began this project 4 years ago and has been unable to complete the construction of the classroom. I have been working with Pastor Rudy and his wife over the past few months and while I was back shared some about Pastor Rudy's vision for this project. I believe this is another great opportunity to serve children in another community and help bring the vision that God has placed on Pastor Rudy's heart 4 years ago into a functioning classroom for the children to learn about Jesus. We ask that you pray for this ministry as well!!

We would like to begin the construction within the next month or two before the rainy season. If interested in contributing to this project please contact me via email or message me. This will allow me to keep track of everything and determine when construction can begin. All donations will be going through Shining the Ministries.
