

### Creating Church Family Memories

"They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people. (Acts 2:42, 46-47)

Isn't it awesome that the Father saw fit to allow us to build and retain memories? Most of us would probably say that the memories we cherish the most are those fun, unique and special times together with family and friends. Christmas mornings when the kids are little; family vacations on the road; sharing funny stories with friends that make you laugh so hard you can't breathe; enjoying life's milestones with one another: these are the moments that stick in our minds. We also cherish sorrowful moments; sitting together around a loved-one's bed as they breathe their last; group hugs after difficult news, or huddling in the basement through a storm.

A common denominator that often makes these times so special is the togetherness of meaningful relationships. Let me ask you, which experiences hold more value and joy, those when you're alone or those where you're surrounded by loved ones?

We find that doing "life-together" enriches our days, and relationship bonds prove themselves to be enormously valuable to us.

There are few social circles beyond the nuclear family that can provide this kind of life-support like a church family does. The best church families are ones that encourage continuing development, but do so while extending amazing grace, high-regard and mutual affection toward one another. I've found that to be true of our relationships in our church family. I find that, for the most part, we highly value one another and try to look out for that which is in the best interest of one another. We don't practice these things perfectly, but I find it to be overwhelmingly true among you all.

This summer we're hoping to build on that foundation by creating opportunities for us to deepen our relational bonds with one another. Rather than the typical Vacation Bible School, we're planning something more like brief staycations where the whole family can have fun, just relaxing and enjoying natural connections with each other.

Some of our families, taking that Acts 2 message to heart, are inviting us over to "break bread" at their homes, where we're sure to come away with "glad and sincere hearts." On June 16<sup>th</sup>, the Fritz's and the Stiemsma's, (whose back yards are adjacent to each other's,) will be holding a good ol' fashioned outdoor fish fry. On June 28<sup>th</sup>, the Baird's are inviting us out for some Farm Fun, and on June 30<sup>th</sup>, we'll have a Family Fun Night with games and other shenanigans at the church. On July 12<sup>th</sup>, the fish will be biting out at the Van Winkle's ponds, and then on July 26<sup>th</sup> we'll get a hay-rack ride tour of Ted Munson's acreage. We'll get to cool off on August 16<sup>th</sup>, splashing around in Greenigs' pool, and we'll close out the summer with an All-Church Picnic out at Jefferson County Park on August 20<sup>th</sup>.

Our hope is that these shared experiences will strengthen, deepen and enliven all of our church family relationships in such a way that some of our most cherished memories to come will be with those who call Fairfield FBC their church home.





May 9, 2023

Members present: Bob Keller, Joyce Roemen, Ted Munson, Dick Hunt, Virgil Symmonds, Jason Crandall, Margaret Stephens, Pastor John Kermott

Devotion and opening prayer was by Vice- Moderator, Jason Crandall, who filled in for Greg Hanshaw.

Dick Hunt motioned to accept previous minutes and Joyce Roemen seconded. Motion passed.

Discussion was held on weapons being brought into church. It was decided to lock the back door during Worship Service.

Changes in calendar item dates: Council meetings will be July 18 and August 15. Boards will meet July 10 & 11 and August 7 & 8. May 14 will be service in Central Park. June 11 will be the second service in the park followed by a Ladies' Tea with <u>Sound of Music</u> theme held in Fellowship Hall.

Financial Report: Bob Keller reported the giving for the month was good.

Old Business: Virgil Symmonds and Bob Keller are making Little Free Pantries: one for food and one for a library to be placed on the church property. These will be stocked with contributions by the congregation.

New Business: Jason Crandall wants to get his Master of Divinity Degree. It would take 3-6 months with a cost of \$1800. We discussed supporting him with half the cost coming out of M&E budget line #612, per approval. It was tabled until next month.

Jason stated a small group has been started at The Well for people with mental challenges.

Ted reported the Pizza Planning Pow-Wow had a lot of brainstorming. C.E. Board talked about a leader for kid's groups and is considering a 20hour/week paid position for someone in our church. They are looking at a "Grow Curriculum" as app to be used.

Next business meeting will be July 16.

Pastor John closed the meeting with prayer.
